NURSES' CORNER

POISON PREVENTION AND TREATMENT TIPS

March 19 - 25 is poison prevention week. In 2014, poison control centers provided assistance for nearly 2.2 human poison exposures-that equals out to be one poison exposure reported to U.S. poison control centers every 15 seconds! The majority of poisonings occur in the home and are accidental. Among children, these things often cause poisonings:

POISON PO

- Medicines
- Pain killers
- Household cleaners
- Hydrocarbons (such as lamp oil, kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid)
- Plants

While children younger than 6 years old compromise a large percentage of cases, poisoning can affect all age groups-infant to seniors.

Ways to prevent accidental poisoning:

- Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children
- Install a safety latch-that locks when you close the door-on child-accessible cabinets containing harmful products
- Purchase and keep all medicines in containers with safety caps. Discard unused medication
- Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dose
- Never tell a child that medicine tastes like candy
- Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers
- Keep coal, wood, or kerosene stoves in safe working order.
- Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors

Treatment

If your child is unconscious, not breathing or having seizures due to poison contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222

Immediate treatment tips:

Swallowed poison: remove item from the child and have child spit out any remaining substance. Do not make your child vomit!

Skin poison: remove the child's clothes and rinse the skin with lukewarm water for at least 15 minutes

Eye poison: Flush the child's eye by holding the eyelid open and pouring a steady stream of room temperature water into the inner corner

Poisonous fumes: Take the child outside or into fresh air immediately. If child has stopped breathing, start CPR and do not stop until the child breathes or help arrives

PLAN NOW FOR SECOND SEMESTER FINALS June 2-6, 2017

Second semester ends Thursday, June 1, 2017. It is important for parents/guardians and students to be aware of the following information prior to final testing. Your cooperation with our policies is appreciated.

- No passes are issued during finals. This includes "Tardy Passes" and "Passes to Leave the Building" for appointments
- No work release privileges will be honored. Students need to inform their employer that they are **not** available for work during finals.
- **No study halls during finals**. Students may use the library or resource rooms during study halls. Students need not be in the building during study hall class periods.
- No visiting the Middle School (or grade schools). Please do not visit other schools during finals without prior approval.

Lunch will be served on Friday (6/2) and Monday (6/5) only. School lunch will not be served on Tuesday (6/6).

SCHOOL MEALS INFORMATION

Breakfast and Lunch menus for all schools are posted monthly at http://cfsd.chipfalls.k12.wi.us//foodServices.cfm

<u>Breakfast</u> is available at all schools. Elementary is \$0.35/day, Middle School is \$0.85 and High School is \$1.00. Additional items can be purchased at the Middle School and High School and each item will be charged individually.

<u>Lunch</u> Elementary cost is \$2.25 and Middle and High School cost is \$2.50. Milk is available for purchase at any school for \$0.35 for all students. If you send a lunch from home, you may want to consider sending a beverage if you do not want to incur a milk charge on your account. Additional items can be purchased at the MS and HS and each item will be charged individually. Students on free or reduced price meals will also be charged for items purchased in addition to the meal. HS has a la carte available for purchase. There must be money in the account to purchase these items.

<u>Payments</u> can be made online through the Parent Portal, by clicking Payments from the left menu. It's secure, free of charge, shows up on the account immediately (make sure you receive a payment receipt), and you have more control over who gets the money and how much you want each child to receive.

Payments can also be sent with your child to school; elementary students may give payment to teacher or school secretary; middle school students can bring payment to the office or pay in the cafeteria during breakfast/lunch; high school students can pay in the cafeteria during lunch. Payments can be mailed to the District Office at 1130 Miles St, Chippewa Falls WI 54729. Payments may also be dropped off at the District Office; a secure night box is available after hours. Payments will be split equally between all students in the household unless specified otherwise. Money can be transferred between accounts at the request of parents. <u>Free/Reduced Meals</u> There is no charge for a reduced price breakfast or lunch. An online application is available through your parent portal. Paper applications are also available at any school and at the District Office.

<u>Viewing lunch balances and meal activity</u>: Parents can view lunch transactions, balances and payment history through the Infinite Campus Parent Portal. (Contact your school office if you need assistance with logging onto the Portal for the first time). When you click on Food Service on the left, all accounts are displayed with their respective balance. Just below the balance section is the transaction detail. You can toggle between students and view the transactions relating to that student.

- If you choose to enroll your child, he/she will receive a plastic bag each Friday with enough food for breakfast and lunch for him/her for Saturday and Sunday, plus snacks and fresh fruit.
- The meals have not been screened for different allergies; therefore, parents are responsible for determining if this program meets your child's dietary and health needs.

NUTRITION FROM THE KITCHEN

Kids and Portion Control

When kids follow MyPlate recommendations for daily servings of foods, they are well on their way to healthy growth and development. Unfortunately, many kids today seem to be suffering from "portion distortion." When talking about what kids eat or drink, keep these definitions in mind.

What Is a "Serving Size"? What Is a "Portion Size"?

A serving is a specific amount of food or drink that is defined by common measurements, such as cups, ounces or tablespoons. Examples include recommended servings from MyPlate (the amount kids should eat) and the serving size on a Nutrition Facts Label, which is the basis for all the other nutrition information on the label. In many cases, the serving size listed on the Nutrition Facts Label is different from the MyPlate recommended serving size. In fact, many of the MyPlate serving sizes are smaller than those listed on the Nutrition Facts Label.

A portion is the amount of food that happens to end up on the plate. Think of portion size as the actual amount of food kids choose to eat at breakfast, lunch, dinner or as a snack. Portions may be larger or smaller than the recommended serving size.

Visualizing Appropriate Portion Sizes

One reason kids may not be eating appropriately sized portions based on the recommended MyPlate serving sizes is that they may not recognize what a reasonable portion looks like. What does one-half cup of pasta look like? What about three ounces of chicken or two tablespoons of peanut butter?

The good news is that kids don't need a measuring cup or scale to measure the portions they should eat — instead, they can visualize them by using familiar objects, such as a tennis ball, that are similar in size to recommended serving sizes. Before they eat or drink, they can think of the relevant object and choose a portion that matches its size.

Here are some tips to help you and your kids visualize portion sizes:

Baseball—1 ounce or one cup of dry cereal, one cup chopped vegetables or salad
Hockey puck—1 ounce or 1/2 piece of a bagel or hamburger bun
Deck of cards - 3oz (recommended serving) of meat, fish or poultry, or ten chips/french fries
Tennis ball—1 small fruit (orange, apple, pear), 1/2 cup of pasta, or a serving of ice cream
Computer mouse—Medium baked potato
Compact disc—One serving of pancake or small waffle
A ping pong ball—Two tablespoons of peanut butter

Help Kids Listen to Their Bodies

One core strategy for healthy eating at all ages is listening to internal hunger and fullness cues. Discuss what it feels like to be hungry and what it feels like to be full with your child. A discussion about the difference between physical hunger and boredom, sadness or tiredness is appropriate for older children. When kids listen to their bodies, the chances of overeating are decreased. Help them understand it is OK to stop eating when they feel full, even if there is food left on the plate.

ELL PROGRAM INFORMATION

My name is Jeannine Geiger and I work with English Language Learners (ELL) at the Chippewa Falls Senior High School and Middle School. Between the two schools, we have the following languages represented: Hmong, Spanish, Chinese, Tagalong and Visayan (both languages from the Philippines), and Macedonian. My students bring many interesting and varied perspectives to the classroom. They are so respectful, and I feel fortunate to work with them.

Recently, we completed ACCESS Language testing. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction requires yearly testing of the English proficiency of the students who speak another language at home. The test measures English proficiency in the four domains of language which are listening, speaking, reading and writing. The results are usually reported in April.

Currently, we have been reading about the parallels between the Jewish refugees of the 1930's to the Syrian refugees of today. We are comparing and contrasting the two situations and will practice argumentative writing related to this topic. Previously, we studied about presidential inaugurations, and how scientists in Ireland combined graphene with Silly Putty which may be used in the future for medical sensors.




